Susan B. Anthony Play

Our member, Ronnie Patterson (and Fargo poet laureate) and her daughter Carrie Lee Patterson wrote the play *Susan's Dream: If Thee Must, Thee Must* several years ago and it was presented at the Loveland Museum. On **March 12 at 6:30 pm**, in honor of the 100th anniversary of the right for women to vote, the play will again be presented under the sponsorship of the Loveland Museum and the Loveland AAUW. It will again be presented at the Museum at 6:30 pm. Carrie is now a professional actress in the Chicago area and is returning here to play the part of Susan B. Anthony. There is no cost for the play but a \$10 donation is suggested. Half of the money raised will go to the Loveland AAUW scholarship fund and half will go to support the Jane DeDecker sculpture *Every Word We Utter*. A maquette of the sculpture will be on display as will juried pieces of art work related to the history of women's suffrage, the visionaries of that time, and the continued quest for voting equality. This will be a public performance. Seating is limited but we are hoping many AAUW members will be able to attend and will bring guests.

Fran Feinerman graduated from Bard College, NY with a bacherlor's in psychology. She went on to earn two MA degrees – one in psychology from Cornell U, the other in history from San Francisco State. She then earned her doctorate in history from the University of Illinois in Chicago. After spending a couple of years in CA as a social worker, she entered career in academic work – a bit of teaching but mostly as the lead administrator in academic aairs. She was the director of a college campus in Alaska, and president of a college in Wyoming. Most of her work was at community colleges. She has lived in 8 states and worked in 6. Important Fact – from the Campaign for Children

Between 2014 and 2018, 14 percent of Colorado's children (more than 168,000 children) lived below the federal poverty line – defined as a total annual income of \$25,100 or less for a family of 4. Of this group, more than 71,000 children lived in extreme poverty, in families struggling to make ends meet with less than \$12,550 per year. Decades of research established that experiencing poverty can impact child well-being in many ways, including having negative effects on a child's mental and behavioral health, as well as their academic achievement.
