Jan Witt introduced Mr. Chuck Banks, a long-time Loveland resident. Chuck's now retired after 32 years working as a surgical tech. He currently volunteers helping clients with Dementia & Parkinson's Disease, and is guite the ambassador for *peace*, *love* & *compassion*.

Chuck's father taught horsemanship in Perris, CA (near Riverside), and introduced him & his 2 older brothers to riding some **unruly** horses. This did not deter Chuck from starting reenactments of Buffalo Soldiers in 1992 in Southern California. For 17 consecutive years, Chuck Banks rode in Pasadena's Tournament of Roses Parade as a Buffalo Soldier representing the 10th Cavalry, Company H.

Through his grandmother, the Chuck Banks' family owns property in Weld County bordering Dearfield, CO (the former Black agricultural community established early in the 20th century). The land deed dates back to 1914, and Banks wants to reestablish a homestead on the 160 acres. During the Dust Bowl, the family would collect cow pies to help heat their home. His grandmother's instruction to the family was to never sell the property.

It was the American Plains Indians who came up with the name *Buffalo Soldiers* because the soldiers' dark, curly hair resembled a buffalo's coat. African-American regiments were formed in 1866, then disbanded in 1944. Congress established all-black regiments to help rebuild the country after the Civil War, and only white officers could lead the troops. Buffalo Soldiers were paid \$13/day, and food & clothing were provided. The enlisted were treated with more dignity & given more resources than they often received in civilian life. Buffalo Soldiers served as first caretakers of the national parks; to test their mettle, the government ordered a bicycle brigade to peddle from Oklahoma to Yosemite National Park!

Chuck Banks brought <u>many</u> artifacts to the meeting (ranging from clothing, bedding, cook pots/utensils, a saddle/bridle/stirrups, a haversack, a saber & other U.S.-stamped items adorned with regimental & troop designation). Many items were multi-purposed (like the tent which could become a raincoat).

There's a proud legacy of the Buffalo Soldiers in their primary duties to support the nation's westward expansion, protect settlers, build infrastructure, and guard U.S. mail & railways. In closing, Chuck Banks shared that historical accounts of the Buffalo Soldiers are still evolving; there has been a surge of online information in the last 10 years - especially during the past 2 years.
